# Curious Cape Cod: Huge overlook hike in Sandwich — an amazing and fun challenge

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

"The Maple Swamp conservation lands consist of 500 acres of upland property that are composed of 25 different parcels. (Ranging) from 40 feet above sea level to 250 feet above sea level, Maple Swamp has spectacular views north across Cape Cod Bay to Provincetown and south to Vineyard Sound."

I probably should have digested the trail map, but luckily there was a big sign that said "Swamp Thing" and "To Overlook," so I headed out, and up. And here's where I must congratulate the folks who designed these trails, because they curve back and forth beautifully through the forest, gaining altitude without a ton of steepness.
